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| superhero | A fictional character that has extraordinary or super-human powers. |
| real-life superhero | A person that takes on a responsibility to their community or other people around them. |
| villain | A character that has evil actions. |
| herione | A woman who, in the opinion of others, has special achievements, abilities, or personal qualities and is regarded as a role model. |
| rescue | Saving someone or something from danger. |
| super-power | An imaginary super-human ability. |
| qualities | A feature that makes a person or thing what it is. |
| behaviour | How a person acts and reacts. |
| role model | Someone others look at as a good example. |
| body part | A part or a section of the human body. E.g. knee, head, arm, leg, etc. |
| sense | Any of five ways to understand or experience the things around us. |



Sticky Knowledge about superheroes, real life superheroes and our super bodies

- ❑ Superman, who first appeared in comic books in 1938, was the first superhero created with super powers.
- ❑ The creator of Wonder Woman also created the first lie detector test.
- ❑ Policemen became to be known as 'bobbies' after Robert Peel who set up the first organised police service in London, 1829.
- ❑ Britain's longest-serving lollipop lady, Margaret Cattle, helped children cross the road safely near their school for 45 years!
- ❑ The parts of our body need blood in order to work properly – blood transports the nutrients each cell needs, and takes away any rubbish.
- ❑ Human noses and ears continue to grow throughout your life, even after you stop growing taller!
- ❑ The five main sense organs are your eyes, ears, nose, tongue and skin.
